I am certainly looking forward to standing in front of them all again, rather than just being beamed onto a screen.

Our pathway to freedom is dependent on us all being safe and sensible so do please keep observing the rules and taking regular tests. I should like to extend my best wishes to everyone for a pleasant break.

During the Spring Term, students attended seven virtual tutorials to emulate current university learning conditions.

Students explored the question '*Architecture, Interior Design and Feminism: Can Feminism alert women of patriarchal house design?*' through which they gained an understanding of what feminism is and what it has to do with architecture, interior design and people's homes.

Students developed their research abilities, enhanced their ability to write academic arguments, gained competency in citing bibliography correctly and applied theory to real case studies.

Graduation certificates were presented to the successful students after they enjoyed cake and treats. Congratulations to all students for working so hard on this project and for achieving such impressive results especially during the lockdown period.

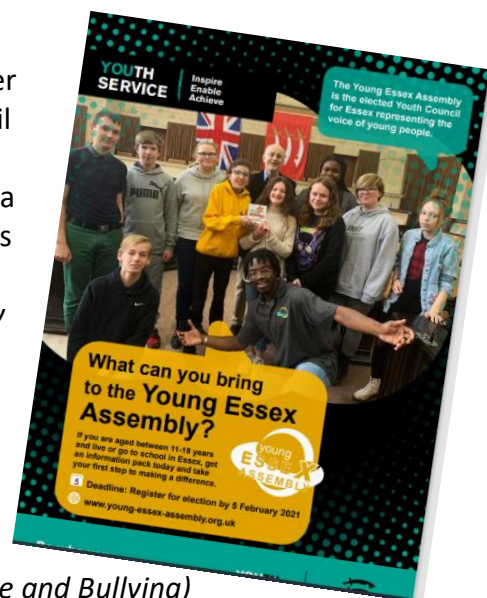

Year 7 student **Joseph Sedgwick** was recently elected as a member of the Young Essex Assembly. The YEA is the elected Youth Council for Essex and gives young people a platform to speak about their views on local issues and implement change. Here Joseph tells us a bit more about the organisation and why being a part of the YEA is so important:

*"The YEA is a Youth Council where young people in our community give students a voice. The YEA spreads across all the districts in Essex including Braintree, Maldon, Colchester, and Chelmsford. Members from across the district meet once a month, and there are also 1 or 2 local meetings. One of the YEA's current projects is called 'Green Spaces'; this is to help make Braintree and Essex a healthier and greener place to live. On our social media pages, we have published something called 'SLAB' (Stress, Low Confidence and Bullying) which lists mental health organizations you can go to if you're feeling low, alongside advice and tips to help with mental health. The Young Essex Assembly is youth in **your** community helping to get **your** voice heard. I signed up to be in the YEA because I believe young people are going to be a big factor in how our world turns out, I hope you believe this too. People who join the YEA are people who want to help you, our community and how we move forward. But of course, we cannot do any of the work without conversations and ideas from you, because you are what makes the YEA the YEA. ## Healthy Bites

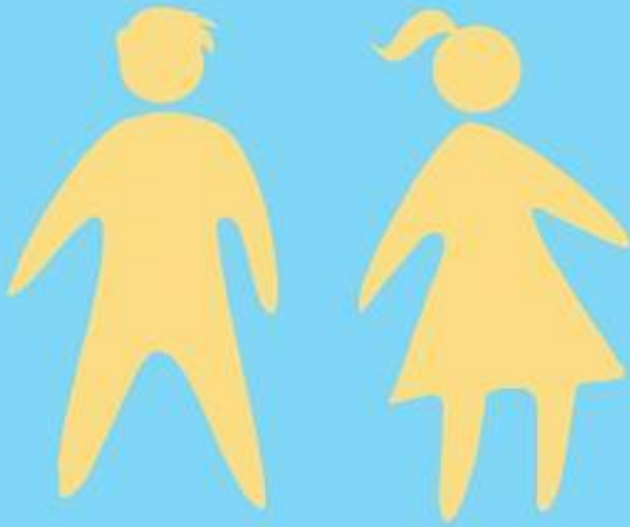
