KS4 Curriculum Art & Design Textiles

CURRICULUM INTENT? What does Textiles help young people achieve at KS4? Why have you made these curriculum choices?

Art & Design Textiles equips students with the skills to enjoy, produce and engage with the visual arts throughout their lives, and it has immense value as a GCSE subject. GCSE in Art & Design Textiles is a broad and flexible course that requires students to develop an appreciation of the creative process through a practical response, using a variety of two-dimensional and three-dimensional media, materials, techniques and processes. Students will explore critically how artists, craftspeople and designers from diverse cultures, times and societies have arrived at solutions through the use of the formal elements. Students will use and develop their knowledge by recording observations and creating outcomes that fully realise their intentions.

Student progress will be monitored, throughout the year, through the regular completion of Learning Review Sheets and Coursework Checklists.

5 Hour Formal Exam 1:.

Knowledge: AO3-Observational Drawing – Sea life

Students will be demonstrating their prior knowledge of drawing and textile

techniques to produce sample pieces from their drawings. Experimentation of textiles skills. AO2/AO3.

Students will be experimenting using various media: pencil/colour pencil/watercolour hand & machine embroidery melting/fusing fabrics AO2.

Students will be developing their critical understanding and experimenting of textiles techniques in reflection of a Textile Artist in spired by Sea Life and learning how to create a textile piece –AO1/AO3

Students will be inspired by the Textile Artists Amira Gale, Kim Thitachi and own artist research.

Students will be introduced to Textile artists who are inspired by 'Sea Life' to develop critical understanding through investigative, analytical, experimental, practical, technical and expressive skills—AO1.

Key Skills: Working from observation. Drawing, painting and Textile Skills – melting and fusing of fabrics. Art History--A01/A02/A03.

GCSE EXAM would usually be set but this year students do not have to complete Component 2 due to disruptions caused by Covid. Component 1 is now weighted at 100%.

Knowledge: GCSE Art exam set: Component 2: Externally Set Assignment. Suggested preparation time: 20 Hours of lessons.

Students will be given an exam paper and timetable to work from.

Students will all be working from the same starting point and title.

Students will have to cover the following three assessment objectives over the course of the term:

AO1: Develop ideas through investigations, demonstrating critical understanding of sources.

AO2: Refine work by exploring ideas, selecting and experimenting with appropriate media, materials, techniques and processes.

AO3: Recording ideas, observations and insights relevant to intentions as work progresses.

Key Skills: Working from students own experimentation and research. Art History (critical understanding) and reflective annotation and evaluation -AO1/AO2/AO3.

Construction and manipulation of Textiles from Drawn designs-AO2.

The current Year 11 cohort will continue to work on Component 1 and extend their coursework project Under the Sea with experimental textile samples leading to their final piece of An Accessory.

Knowledge – Textile techniques and interpretation of Artists work into stitch.

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Introduction to the Topic of 'Under the Sea' Independent research of Designers and Textile Artists inspired by the topic. – AO1

Development of Tie-dye and introduction to Shibori and colouring of fabric. Developing Textile skills to produce fabric samples.

Introduction to Fashion Designers; Alexandra McQueen, Ellie Saab, Valentino, Felicity Brown and Iris van Herpen Introduction to Textile artist Carolyn Saxby Drawing, painting, development of skills and design to produce a FINAL PIECE of a Textile Accessory. AO1/AO3

5 Hour Formal Exam 2: Knowledge: AO1/AO2/AO3-

Introduction of Batik, samples, and research preparation for exam.

Repeat pattern using research of Amiria Gale Artist.

Knowledge: AO3-Observational Drawing

Students will be demonstrating their prior knowledge of drawing and repeat pattern using Batik to produce a finished piece of fabric. Experimentation of textiles skills. A02/A03.

Key Skills: Working from observation - AO1/AO2/AO3.

10 HOUR EXAM OVER TWO DAYS will not take place this year.

Knowledge: GCSE Art exam sat: Component 2: Externally Set Assignment: 10 Hours. Students will be working on the fourth assessment objective.

AO4: present a personal and meaningful response that realises intentions and demonstrates understanding of visual language.

ALL EXAM WORK SUBMITTED FOR MODERATION BY LCH/DDK.

All students must create a Digital Portfolio for submission to Pearson Edexcel.

Students will then be allocated time to refine and review their Coursework projects.
