**Year 7 students** took part in various classes based around Languages. Activities included learning the words to a song in German, building the Brandenburg Gate out of newspaper in Technology, tasting German dishes and learning about Franz Marc, a German painter, in Art.











**Year 8** students experienced a health & lifestyle 'Divergence Day', learning about and participating in alternative sports. Students took part in the following classes:

- Street Dance students learned a dance from the London 2012 Olympics Opening Ceremony.
- **Kabaddi** students learned how to play this ancient Indian team game where opposing teams attempt to gain points by sending a team member into the opposition's half who must touch one or more members of the opposition to score.


