# **Jack Petchey Speak Out** Challenge






# **PE Rewards Trip**

# Skills Day – March 2023

On 28<sup>th</sup> March, it was Skills Day and each of our year groups was involved in exciting activities that took place beyond our normal curriculum.

**Year 7 students** took part in a technology 'Designing in Context' day. These sessions were based around the school's production of 'Wonderland' and included prop construction, designing promotional posters and programmes, creating computer games based on Alice in Wonderland and making tarts and cakes for a tea party. Each group rotated and covered three of the sessions.









**Year 8 students** were involved in a PE and Performing Arts day, with activities including Street Dance, Physical Theatre, Ultimate Frisbee and Flag Football. They also had a chance to try unfamiliar sports with sessions in Kabaddi, Sepak Takraw, and Spikeball.













**Year 9 students** enjoyed a day at the Imperial War Museum at Duxford.











**Year 10 students** took part in mock interviews and a 'Careers Ready' day. Students were asked to bring a copy of their CV to the mock interviews, that took place with volunteers from local businesses including: **Braintree McDonald's, NHS, HSBC, Essex Highways, Make Happen, Colchester Institute, Braintree District Council, Nexus Tamdown, Anderson Property Developers and the Department for <b>Work & Pensions.** Sessions were also held to help students improve their interview skills and identify transferable skills for their future, as well as working on their communication and critical thinking skills to help increase their confidence.





**Year 11 students** who are studying **French** had the opportunity to visit St Omer and try out their language skills whilst visiting the local markets and food shops.





Remaining **Year 11 students** took part in Science and Maths revision sessions, including some 'Escape Room'-style challenges, to help them to prepare for the forthcoming GCSEs.

# **Bleed Bag Donation**

On Tuesday 14<sup>th</sup> November, we were visited by Julie Taylor and the school was given a Bleed Control Kit, in memory of Julie's grandson Liam Taylor, issued by the Daniel Baird Foundation and funded by the Lions Club, Braintree.

Julie has worked tirelessly since her grandson was fatally stabbed in Writtle, Chelmsford, in January 2020, to deliver Bleed Control Kits to a number of establishments including schools, pubs and clubs across the county. In addition to this, Julie has addressed many audiences on knife crime and the terrible impact of carrying knives.

Each Bleed Control Kit costs £102 and they were invented by the mother of Daniel Baird who was fatally stabbed in 2017 in Birmingham. It is important to point out that the Bleed Control Kit can be used in the event of any incident that causes extensive bleeding and this includes trauma from accidental injuries caused by broken glass or a road traffic accident, for example. Here at Alec Hunter Academy, we are proud to accept delivery of the Bleed Control Kit and whilst we hope never to need to use it, it is reassuring to know that we have a kit on site. The kit is also available to the public to use during school operating hours and is located in the main reception.

# **Remembrance Day**




